**Abstract:** Legal documents, financial papers, correspondence, photographs, and other

assorted papers of the Hirsch family of Charleston, South Carolina, and New York, New York. Materials relate to Jacob Hirsch and his wife, Esther Hirsch; his sons, Max Joseph Hirsch, an actor in New York's Yiddish theaters, Louis Hirsch, and Isaac "Bingo" Hirsch; his daughter Julia Hirsch; Max's wife Sylvia Charen Hirsch, and his daughter Betty Hirsch Lancer.

# **Biographical Note**

Jacob Hirsch (1872-1928), youngest son of Wolf Baer Hirsch, was born in 1872 in Mogielnica, Poland. His first wife, Pearl Gottfrei, died in Poland circa 1904. The couple had three children: Max Joseph Hirsch (1894-1987), Sadie Hirsch, and Molly Hirsch. Emigrating from Poland to America in the early 1900s, Hirsch settled in New York, later sending for his son and daughter in 1910. In New York Hirsch married Esther Pieman/Pyman (b. 1878). The couple had five children: Rose Hirsch, Julia Hirsch, Rebecca Hirsch, Louis Hirsch (b. 1908) and Isaac "Bingo" Hirsch (1916-1985). Moving to Charleston, South Carolina, the family lived at 174 St. Philip Street where Hirsch earned a living during Prohibition making and selling kosher schnapps from his home. After his death in 1928, the family returned to New York.

In 1921, Max Joseph Hirsch, a tailor in the garment district and an actor in the Yiddish theatre, married Sylvia Charen (1902-1995), the oldest daughter of Nathan Charen, a baker, and Bella Rozalsky Charen, at the Daughters of Israel hall on St. Philip Street in Charleston, South Carolina. The couple lived above a used clothing store they operated on King Street. They had three children: Danny Hirsch (1922-1993), Betty Hirsch Lancer (1924-), and Pearl Hirsch Baker (1927-). Wanting to return to the theatre, Hirsch moved the family back to New York after the birth of his first child. In 1924 his wife returned to Charleston to give birth to their second child. Hirsch remained in New York but rejoined the family in Charleston six months later. Settling on St. Philip Street, Hirsch worked as a cloth peddler, and later, after the Great Depression, as a milkman for Crescent Dairy and Rephan Dairy. After World War II the family opened a notions business at 157-9 East Bay Street.

Contains bankbook from the Bank of Charleston, a car payment book to General Motors Acceptance Corporation, and a 1918 letter from the Red Cross in Frankfurt, Germany, notifying him of the death of his parents.

Box 1 Folder 2 Esther Hirsch certificate of naturalization, 1953, 1954

Also includes petition for citizenship.

Max Joseph Hirsch, 1917-1974, undated

Box 1 Folder 3 General, 1917-1974, undated

Includes assorted correspondence, clippings, and receipts, as well as Hirsch's certificate of naturalization, Lyric Theatre playbills listing Hirsch as an actor, a 1940 program of the 18th Kalushiner Society Banquet, and a 1949 black and white cast photo of a "Womanless Wedding" staged in the social hall of the Beth Israel synagogue.

Contains a report card from the third grade, handmade high school banquet menus, achievement medal awarded from the Bennett Public School, and a letter from the War Department to Isidore Itzic Lancer, father of David Lancer and father-in-law of Betty Hirsch Lancer, announcing the death of his son, Murray Lancer, killed by friendly fire on 31 December 1944, as well as a letter to David Lancer from Lt. E. J. Urban, Murray Lancer's commanding officer.
