Descriptive Summary

Abstract: The collection consists of photographs, photograph albums, diaries,

scrapbooks, High School of Charleston and university materials,

correspondence, travel souvenirs, oral histories, and family interviews of Sandra Garfinkel and Morton Henry Shapiro. The majority of materials document Sandra Garfinkel Shapiro's youth, from her teenage years

through her graduation from University of North Carolina in 1957, with the largest portion of the collection consisting of photographs of Sandra and her family and friends, including albums documenting her travel to Israel in 1952 and Mexico in 1954, and participation in Young Judaea events and conventions throughout her high school years. Also included is an oral history interview with Morton H. Shapiro in which he discusses his career working with labor unions, and several interviews he recorded with

members of the Shapiro family.

Biographical Note

Sandra Garfinkel Shapiro (1935-) was born to Annie and Sam Garfinkel in Charleston, South Carolina. Both of her parents were born in Divin, Belarus, and both had the last name of Garfinkel before they married. Throughout her youth and adolescence, Sandra was active in Young Judaea, a Zionist youth organization. In 1952, she received a scholarship through Young Judaea to spend six weeks in Israel, traveling with a group organized by the World Zionist Organization. After high school, Sandra attended the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. While in college, she met Morton Henry Shapiro and the couple married in 1955. Following her wedding, Sandra transferred to the University of South Carolina, where she completed her bachelor's degree in history in 1957. Morton and Sandra then moved to Greensboro, North Carolina, and had two children, Rachel and Eric. In 1966, the family relocated to Atlanta, Georgia, where Sandra earned a degree in interior design from Georgia State. The Shapiros settled in Portland, Oregon, in 1977 and Sandra began working at Ethan Allen, a furniture and home décor company, where she remained until her retirement in 2000. In the 1980s, she became interested in genealogy and began researching her family, authoring several articles on her research in the newsletters of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Oregon and the Jewish Historical Society of South Carolina, and eventually becoming president of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Oregon.

Sandra's husband, Morton Henry Shapiro (1928-2007), was born to Rega Kaizen and Jacob Shapiro in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. After graduating from Temple University in 1950 with a bachelor's degree in psychology, he began working for the International Ladies Garment Workers Union (ILGWU). He was drafted into the United States Army in 1951 and served until 1953, returning to the ILGWU upon completing his service. After almost two decades, he left the ILGWU and pursued a number of jobs with labor unions across the United States. He worked as a labor consultant, the Director of the Oregon State Employees' Association, and with the Service Employees International Union (SEIU), before retiring in 1996. In addition to his career working with labor unions, he was also involved with the civil rights movement in the South.

Collection Overview

The majority of materials document Sandra Garfinkel Shapiro's youth, from her teenage years through her graduation from University of North Carolina in 1957, with the largest portion of the collection consisting of photographs of Sandra and her family and friends, including albums documenting her travel to Israel in 1952 and Mexico in 1954, and participation in Young Judaea events and conventions throughout her high school years. The collection also contains correspondence, mainly from Sandra to various family members and friends, diaries spanning 1949-1955, and high school yearbooks. Also included are extensive genealogical research files compiled by Sandra between the 1980s and early 2000s, containing family trees, passenger lists, family history forms, and handwritten notes. Also included are a number of materials documenting Morton Shapiro's family and his genealogical research, including extensive oral history interviews conducted by Shapiro with members of his family. Of particular note is an oral history interview with Morton himself, in which he discusses his work with labor unions, his involvement in the civil rights movement, and relations between Jews and African Americans in the South.
